Important Reminders

- Be sure to complete your entry (including the final "Submit" step) no later than June 19th.
- Recommended browsers: Google Chrome or Mozilla Firefox. Older versions of Internet Explorer may cause unexpected results.
- Register all entries for each exhibitor in the family before proceeding to the Payment section.
- Be sure to click the "Submit" button when you have completed your entries. Entries are not final until they have been submitted.
- Check your email inbox for a confirmation email with a list of your entries and any related fees.
- You will receive a second email when your entries have been approved by your fair.
- 1. Entry Site for all Exhibitors http://polkcountyfairWl.fairentry.com
- 2. (First time) Click on the link to create a FairEntry Account. (After that, if you are logging back in, enter the email & password that you created and click the Sign in link.)
- 3. Enter your email address twice and click Create Account. *IMPORTANT:* This must be a valid email address, so that you can receive the necessary confirmation messages.
- 4. On the Account Creation page, enter information into the fields (all are required). Account Name, Phone, Password (enter twice to confirm).
- 5. Click Create Account.
- 6. Click "Begin Registration"

Exhibitor Information.

- 1. Click on the appropriate choice for your entry.
- 2. Enter the information into the four fields—all fields are required. Click Continue when all information is entered.
- 3. (If you entered/spelled something incorrectly on the previous screen, you have the option to Delete this Exhibitor on this screen.) Enter the information on the Contact Info screen—the only required field is the top Home Phone Number. You can use the same email address that you used to create the account, or an alternate one. If you wish to receive text messages, enter your cell phone number and carrier. That number can be the same as the Home Phone Number entered above, or different. Click Continue when you are finished entering data.
- 4. Enter your mailing address. All fields, except Address continued, are required. As the onscreen help states, the address entered here will be used for mailing premium checks, etc. Click Continue when all information is entered correctly.
- 5. If your fair set up custom fields/questions for you to answer, those will be step 4 on the progress bar at the top. Answer any questions and click Continue.
- 6. Review your exhibitor information. If any information is incorrectly, click the green Edit button in the appropriate group to change it. When all information is correct, click Continue to Entries.

Creating Entries - Each exhibitor can have multiple entries. One entry must be made for each item, animal, class, etc. For example, if an exhibitor is bringing 2 photographs, two entries into the photography class must be created. If an exhibitor is showing one horse in 5 events, five class entries must be created. Once all entries have been created for the first exhibitor, you have the choice of creating another exhibitor in this family (and entries) or proceeding to check-out (submitting the entries, whether or not fees are charged).

- 1. Click Add an Entry beside the correct exhibitor (if more than one has been created).
- 2. Click Select beside the first department you wish to enter. Any departments that are not available for entry will be noted as "Not Available" with a short explanation.
- 3. After you select a department, you will see a list of divisions to select from, and then a list of available classes. Also notice that there are blue "Change" links in case you mistakenly select an incorrect department, division, or class.
- 4. After you have selected the class, click the green Continue button.
- 5. If this is an <u>animal class entry</u>, you may be required to specify which animal will be exhibited in this class; that may be optional; or you may NOT be able to specify the animal at entry time. If you are able to do that, you will see the option to "Add an animal".
- 6. Fill in all of the fields with information about the animal you intend to exhibit. Click Create and Add Animal when finished.
- 7. If the animal information was entered incorrectly, you have the option to either Remove From Entry (creating a new animal) or Edit Animal Details. When it's correct, click Continue.
- 8. Any questions related to entry in this class will be next. Click Continue after answering those questions.
- 9. The Review screen allows you to double check this entry for accuracy, and make any changes necessary. When the information is correct, click Continue and that class entry is complete.
- 10. When each class entry is complete, you have 3 choices for what to do next:
 - a. If all class entries have been completed for one exhibitor, you can **Register another Exhibitor** in this family.
 - If this exhibitor has more class entries to make, you can Add another Entry for this Exhibitor.
 - c. If all entries for all exhibitors in the family have been completed, **Continue to Payment** to finalize and submit your entries.
- 11. Review your entries for completeness and accuracy. *Notice the Summary and Detail buttons at the top of the list on the right.* If there are errors, click on the green Entries section at the top of the page, Click Continue when all information is correct.
- 12. Read the payment instructions and select your method of payment. You may either mail a check or pay with a credit card. **NOTE: Even if you owe no money (no fees are charged)** you must click Continue to the last "Confirm" step to submit your entries.
- 13. Read the information in the "After you Submit" section. You will have to check a box to "Agree to Terms". Click Submit to finalize the entries for the exhibitors in this family. After you click Submit, no changes are possible to these entries.

How to Exhibit At the Polk County Fair

General Rules, Regulations and Directions

All Entries Must Be Postmarked by June 19 of the current exhibit year

Exhibit at the Polk County Fair

- 1. Open and Senior Division exhibitors must be Polk County residents unless they are immediate household members of a qualified Junior Division exhibitor as noted below.
- Junior Division exhibitors must be a member of a recognized youth organization (4-H, FFA, Scouts, etc.) that is based in Polk County. Please refer to the specific Dept/Class for any additional rules/requirements/restrictions for participation.
- 3. Members of FFA chapters in school districts that encompass areas in more than one county including Polk County may exhibit as a Junior Division exhibitor at the Polk County Fair regardless of county of residence AND with the written consent of their FFA advisor.
- 4. All students, grades 3-12, in schools or home-schooled in Polk County or who are residents of Polk County can enter in the Junior Division Department 35J (School Exhibits).

The following areas and shows are judged prior to the Polk County Fair.

- Dog Show
- Cat Show (including Pet Pals/Cavies)
- Music, Drama, Dance Revue
- Computer Revue
- Speaking & Demonstrations
- Shooting Sports Events
- Aerospace Fly-Offs
- Clothing Revue

Only Polk County residents can exhibit in the Open Division or Senior Division. Members of recognized youth organizations based in Polk County may enter in the Junior Division. All students, grades 3-12, in schools or home-schooled in Polk County or who are residents of Polk County can enter in the Junior Division Department 35J (School Exhibits).

Step One: Prepare Your Entry Form

- Determine what you would like to enter by finding the appropriate lot number in the premium book. Remember, youth may enter in either the Junior Division or Open Division but not in both. Adults may enter in either the Open Division or Senior Citizen Division but *NOT* both.
- 2. Go to www.BlueRibbonFair.com/BRFairProd/BlueRibbonStart.aspx?ID=1914 and enter online or fill in the department number, class, lot number and description of each exhibit on the appropriate entry form in the front or back of this book. Please use ink and write clearly.
- 3. You may enter only one exhibit for each lot number. (Exception: Open Division beef, swine, sheep, dairy goat, llama, alpaca, and horse exhibitors may enter two in each lot number.)
- 4. You may enter only 23 exhibits. 4-H members in Exploring may only enter 10 exhibits.

- Cloverbud entry forms with instructions can be obtained from 4-H club leaders and are to be mailed directly to Michelle Peterson, 471 Random Drive, Amery, WI 54016 by June 19 of the current exhibit year. CANNOT BE ENTERED ONLINE.
- 6. Double check your entry for errors and make a record for yourself.
- 7. Complete the bottom portion of your entry form and complete any stall/pen fees. (See fees chart below) Mail the entry form with payment for the exhibitor fee and any stall fees to the superintendent of entries. Do not ask for any extra stalls or pens. Entries must be postmarked by June 19 of the current exhibit year.
- 8. Entries for the Open Horse shows are completed on the day of the show.

Step Two: Get Your Entries Ready

- 1. Be sure to check the premium book for specific requirements (size, method, number, packaging, etc.) for your entry and adhere to these requirements.
- 2. Animal exhibitors should read health regulations carefully. Animal health papers must be presented before you may unload your animals at the fair.
- 3. All exhibitors of animals in purebred lot numbers must show registration papers as requested.
- 4. If you discover an error or need to make a change on your entry form, you must contact the Superintendent of Entries by the change deadline (**July 3 of the current exhibit year**).
- 5. Make sure you have all the equipment and supplies needed for your exhibit.
- 6. Junior Division exhibitors need to check the judging schedule so that you know which day your exhibits will be judged face-to-face and plan accordingly.
- 7. All exhibits regardless of judging date must be in place by 7 p.m. on Wednesday of current exhibit year.

Step Three: Bring Your Entries to the Fair

- 1. Do not bring exhibits prior to 1 pm on Wednesday of current exhibit year. Fair officials are not responsible for exhibits brought in earlier than that time. All exhibits must be brought to the appropriate building or conference judging area on Wednesday of current exhibit year between 1 pm and 7 pm. The following are exceptions to this requirement:
 - a. Junior, Open and Senior citizen flowers and house plants (Dept. 15J, 15 and 150) must be in place by 6 pm on Wednesday of current exhibit year.
 - b. Dairy and llamas must be unloaded and stalled by noon on Thursday of current exhibit year. These animals may be brought in on Wednesday if desired.
 - c. Hogs must be unloaded and in pens by 6 pm on Wednesday of current exhibit year.
- 2. Report to the Superintendent of Entries in the Administrative Building to pick up your exhibit tags and for directions to the appropriate exhibit building.
- 3. Check tags for errors. Only the Superintendent of Entries may alter tags and judges sheets.
- 4. You will receive a wristband with your entry tags. This wristband is your season pass and must be worn for entry into the fair park on subsequent days. Exhibitors who cannot wear the wristband because of health issues or work/employment regulations must obtain an alternative pass from the Fair Secretary.
- 5. Wristbands must be placed on the exhibitor's wrist securely.
- 6. Junior exhibitors need to check the judging schedule to assure they are present for face-to-face and/or conference judging of exhibits.
- 7. Exhibitors submitting entries and then not exhibiting or attending the fair shall forfeit all stall and cage fees as well as the cost of the exhibitor gate admission ticket. Exhibitors attending the fair may still pick up their exhibitor season pass.

Step Four: Exhibiting and Judging

- 1. Attach your exhibit tag to your entry and save the bottom portion (claim ticket) for use on the final fair day to pick up your exhibit.
- 2. Bring the exhibit to the designated exhibit building.
- 3. Open and Senior Citizen Division exhibitors do not need to be present for judging. Exhibits must be in place by 7 pm on Wednesday of current exhibit year. Open and Senior class flower entries must be in by 6 pm.
- 4. Junior Division Exhibitors—all of your exhibits must be in place by 7 pm on Wednesday of current exhibit year even if you must return on another day for face-to-face judging.
- 5. Report to the judging area with your exhibit on the day and time designated for face-to-face judging. You will be directed on what to do with your exhibit after judging is completed.
- 6. Animals must be in the show ring promptly after being called. Any exhibitor failing to comply will be excluded from competing. No one, except exhibitors of animals, judges, and fair officials will be allowed inside a show ring during the exhibition.
- 7. No pets or other animals are allowed at the fair park unless they are part of an exhibit or are a service animal.
- 8. Exhibits are to be entered in the name of the owner. Junior division exhibitors may enter and show managerial animals provided a managerial agreement between the owner and exhibitor has been approved and discussed.
- 9. No selling of animals (except quality meat animals) allowed until after 4:30 pm on Sunday of current exhibit year.
- 10. All exhibits must remain at the fair park until 4:30 pm on Sunday of current exhibit year. Any exhibitor removing exhibits prior to this time will forfeit premiums. The only exception is if a fair official or the veterinarian orders/allows animals to be removed for health or safety reasons.
- 11. You must care for your exhibit during the fair. Failure to feed and water animals and to maintain clean pens/stalls may result in forfeiture of all premiums.
- 12. Premiums checks will be distributed in October or November. Please cash them promptly. In the event State Aid for premiums in not received, reduced premiums may be paid to exhibitors.

Overnight Barn Passes

Overnight barn permits will be limited. Youth interested in staying in the barns must register with their leader or advisor prior to the fair. Animal numbers will be utilized in determining the number of youth awarded overnight barn passes. Any changes during the fair must be approved by the Extension Office. Barn permits are issued by the Extension Office and must be picked up by the exhibitor prior to 5:00 pm of the day that the permit is to be used. No open class exhibitors can stay in the barns overnight.

Judges and Types of Judging

Judges will be selected from outside Polk County as is feasible. Every effort will be made to engage the most qualified judges.

Open and Senior Citizen Divisions:

Regular judging and placing is followed for these divisions. This procedure is one first place, one second place, one third place and one fourth place regardless of the number of entries in each lot number. Judges are not required to award a placing(s) if none of the exhibits warrant the placing.

Junior Division:

Face-to-face judging procedure is used in many departments as this is an educational focused fair. The exhibitor brings the exhibit to the judge; the judge discusses the exhibit with the exhibitor; and then the judge places the exhibit in the appropriate award group according to or comparing it to a standard of perfection or the ideal.

The Danish judging system is used for all other junior exhibits. This is described in detail in ATCP 160.92(3) (a). The awards for each placing are based on the number of entries in the lot. Judges may award more blue or red ribbons than allowed but the premiums must be paid according to the Danish system. In lots with only one exhibitor, judges are not required to award a placing if the exhibit does not warrant the placing.

Judges are instructed in cases of attempted interference on the part of exhibitors or members of their families with the judges' deliberations and decisions, to exclude parties so offending from competition in the particular lot number.

All protests against awards made must be in writing and signed by the party deeming him/herself aggrieved. A protest must be delivered to the Fair Secretary within 2 days after the award was made. A protest shall include specifications of charges and/or grounds of complaint and the name(s), address (es), and phone numbers(s) of witness (es). The Fair Secretary shall present the protest to the Board of Directors for review, discussion and decision.

Supervision and Liability

The general supervision of the exhibition is vested in the Officers and Board of Directors of the Polk County Fair Society. Exhibitors or others desirous of special privileges must apply to the Officers or Board of Directors.

Careless driving on or near the fair park is prohibited by law.

State Statutes regarding consumption and possession of alcoholic beverages will be enforced at the fair park. Any exhibitor found in violation of the Statute will not receive premiums earned.

In no case shall the Polk County Fair Society or any of its officers, directors or superintendents be held responsible for any loss, damage, injury or death by disease, theft or from any other cause of any character to any property while same is at the fair park or any other time or place. The management hereby assumes no responsibility either as Bailee or otherwise for any property being brought or kept on said ground.

If the property owners or others interested in the property desire protection against loss, damage or injury from fire or from any other cause, they must make their own arrangements and pay for such insurance.

In no case shall the Polk County Fair Society or any of its officers, directors, superintendents or volunteers be held responsible or liable for any loss, damage, or injury sustained by any exhibitor.

The Board of Directors and Officers reserve the full and absolute right to interpret the foregoing rules and regulations, and to arbitrarily settle and determine matters, questions and differences in regard thereto, or otherwise arising out of, or connected with, or incident to the fair.

REGULATIONS FOR STATE AID

Governing County & District Fair Wisconsin Administrative Code Chapter ATCP 160

ATCP 160.01 Definitions. As used in this chapter:

- (1) "Breed class" and "breeding class" mean a specific breed within a class such as holstein in the dairy class.
- (2) "Class" means a grouping in which exhibits may be entered, including an animal breed or age group for animal exhibits; a type of produce, crop or food; or a specific age, age group or educational grade level of exhibitor.
- (2m) "Conference judging" means a judging system using a discussion about each exhibit with the entire group.
- (3) "Danish judging system" means a judging system that allows for multiple first, second, third and fourth class selections as provided in s. ATCP 160.91 (4) (b).
- (4) "Department" as it relates to the organizational structure of a fair, means an animal species, production group, or other principal classification of exhibits. As used in any other context, "department" means the state of Wisconsin department of agriculture, trade and consumer protection.
- (5) "Division" means one of 3 exhibitor group classifications for a fair and is limited to junior division, open division and senior citizens division.
- (6) "Entry class" means a class in which the fair allows exhibitors to submit entries.
- (7) "Exotic domestic animal" means an animal that is not a common farm animal.
- (7e) "Face-to-face judging" means a judging system using a semiprivate discussion between the judge and the exhibitor with the following phases:
 - (a) Get acquainted.
 - (b) Learn the background of the exhibit.
 - (c) Self-evaluation.
 - (d) Evaluator comment.
 - (e) Parting.
- (7m) "Fair" means a county or district fair eligible to receive state aid under s. 93.23 (1) (b) or (c), Stats.
- (7s) "Fair board" means the governing entity of a fair.
- (8) "Lot" or "lot number" means the numerical designation assigned by a fair for a specific category of exhibits within a class.
- (9) "Market class" means a class that includes animals of a certain weight for the species that can be sold for slaughter.
- (10) "Premium" means a monetary prize that a fair awards to an exhibitor after judging all competing exhibits in the class to which the premium pertains.
- (11) "Regular judging system" means a judging system that allows for one first, second, third and fourth class selection as provided in s. ATCP 160.91 (4) (c).
- (12) "Self determined project" means a project that meets all of the following criteria:
 - (a) It is approved by the fair board.
 - (b) Its subject matter is related to any of the junior fair departments 9, 10, 13 to 16, 18, or 20 to 29.
 - (c) It does not fall into a defined entry class within any department.
 - (d) It is carried out by a member of a youth organization.
- (13) "Youth organization" means an organization under adult leadership that has educational programing. History: Cr. Register, November, 1990, No. 419, eff. 12-1-90; cr. ATCP 160.02 Premium requirements.

(1) General.

- (a) The state aid authorized by s. 93.23 (1), Stats., may be paid on net premiums paid by a fair. The department may withhold state premium aid from any fair that does not enforce animal health provisions under ch. ATCP 10 that are applicable to animals exhibited at the fair. State aid will be paid only on premiums actually paid by bank check or draft.
- (b) No deductions may be made from premium money won by an exhibitor. Premiums may, however, be withheld where exhibition rules established by the fair association are violated. A written statement of violation shall be submitted to the department to justify actions taken by a fair.
- (c) Premiums offered shall be definite in amount. No decrease or increase in published premiums may be made because of the financial condition or the organization or for any other reason.
- (e) No fair may receive state aid for a premium awarded to any exhibitor in the open division if that exhibitor entered the same exhibit in the junior division at the same fair. This paragraph does not apply if the exhibit was entered in the junior division only as part of a herd group, carcass class or performance class.
- (f) No state aid will be paid on the cost of ribbons, cups, trophy prizes or entertainment contests.

(2) Premium lists.

- (a) Premiums for which state aid is requested by county and district fairs shall conform with the uniform premium list and other requirements set forth in these rules. Fairs requesting state aid for net premiums shall submit to the department a printed copy of the premium list used at the fair, as required under s. ATCP 160.92 (3) (c).
- (b) The officers of each fair shall mail a copy of the premium list to other associations, societies, or boards conducting a fair in Wisconsin upon request.
- (c) Sections ATCP 160.01 through 160.07 and 160.91 shall be published in premium books used by a fair for which state aid is requested.

(3) Entry fees.

- (a) A fair may charge an exhibitor an entry fee or charge stall rents for animals, or both.
- (b) Exhibitors in department 35 shall not be required to purchase an exhibitor's ticket. Any other exhibitor may be required, if no entry fee is charged, to purchase an exhibitor's season ticket at a price not to exceed that charged for a non-exhibitor's season ticket.

(4) Split fair dates.

- (a) For purposes of this subsection, "split fair dates" occur when a fair organization judges exhibits or contests and pays premiums at more than one time or at more than one location during the calendar year.
- (b) Except as provided under par. (c), the department may not pay state aid for a fair having split dates unless the department gives advance written approval for a split fair. The department may approve split dates based on hardship.
- (c) The department may pay state aid for the following exhibits or contests in a fair having split dates with advance notification to the department:
 - 1. Clothing revue.
 - 2. Demonstrations.
 - 3. Favorite foods revue.
 - 4. Dogs.
 - 4m. Cats.
 - 5. Small animals.
 - 6. Rocketry.
 - 7. Shooting sports.
 - 7m. Mechanical projects.

8. Other exhibits and contests that are similar to those identified in subds. 1, to 7.

(d) If there are split dates under par. (b) or (c), all blue ribbon winners shall repeat their demonstrations or exhibits at the regular fair dates unless the department grants a hardship exemption. An exhibitor may use audio-visual media, still photography or an educational display to repeat a demonstration or exhibit. History: Cr. Register, November, 1990, No. 419, eff. 12-1-90; r. and recr. ATCP 160.03 Exhibition requirements. A fair shall meet all of the exhibition requirements of this section to be eligible for state premium aid.

- (1) No fair society or other organization sponsoring a fair may require an exhibitor to become a member of the organization in order to enter an exhibit at the fair, nor may the sponsoring organization make any deduction from an exhibitor's premium as a donation to the fair society, or require an exhibitor in any other way to make a donation to the society.
- (2) State aid may not be approved for out-of-state exhibits or for separate classes of local and non-local exhibitors. Aid may not be approved for payment of premiums to an exhibitor having an out-of-state address but claiming Wisconsin residency unless the fair secretary provides the department with an affidavit that the exhibitor's residence is geographically located within the state.
- (3) State aid may be paid only on articles or animals actually on display in an exhibit building or actually shown in the show ring on regular fair dates unless approval for split fair dates is obtained under s. ATCP 160.02 (4). State aid may not be paid on Dairy Herd Improvement Association records, transportation aid, production contests or other special educational exhibits unless prior approval is obtained under s. ATCP 160.49 (7).
- (4) State aid may not be paid on exhibits removed from the fairgrounds before 4 p.m. on the last day of the fair, or such other later time as may be specified by the fair, without prior approval of the department. Authority for earlier removal may be granted by the department in case of meat animal sales or other special classes, if requested before the beginning of the fair. In other hardship cases, approval may be granted by the fair. Exhibits in dog obedience and small animal pet classes may be judged during the regular fair but are not required to remain present during the entire fair. The fair may prescribe the length of time junior fair exhibitors of horses shall keep their animal on the ground.

ATCP 160.05 Open division; general requirements.

- (1) The total maximum premiums set forth for all places in any open division livestock class, excluding poultry and rabbits, may be divided into multiple premiums for a greater number of places, but the maximum premium offered for any additional place shall not be higher than the maximum for the last place in the class.
- (2) All animals in any open division class shall be owned by the exhibitor, except as provided in s. ATCP 160.09.
- (3) State aid may be paid on no more than 2 premiums awarded an exhibitor under one premium or lot number in open division individual livestock classes, except poultry and rabbits, and no more than one premium in all other classes, including poultry and rabbits.
- (4) State aid may not be used to award a premium to an exhibitor who exhibits an item or animal that has been exhibited in open class division previously in a state aid funded fair in that calendar year and resulted in a premium being awarded for that item or animal.
- (5) The fair board may establish specific classes by professional and amateur level groupings within classes for open class departments 14 to 28. History: Cr. ATCP 160.07 Classes; general requirements.

- (1) Classes may be combined if the number of entries in several single classes is insufficient. If any classes are combined, state aid shall be limited to the maximum total premiums listed for a single class of animals, items or articles in that department.
- (2) (a) Except as provided under par. (b), no fair may receive state aid for premiums awarded for sexually intact male dairy cattle, beef cattle, sheep, goats, swine or horses unless those animals are registered. Registered status shall be documented by a certificate of registry from the appropriate breed association or society, or by a copy of the application for registration.
 - (b) Paragraph (a) does not apply to dairy cattle exhibited at a fair if a national breed association certifies that those dairy cattle are recorded in that breed association's qualified herd book which records the genealogy of that breed.
- (3) Any animal entered as part of a group class may also be exhibited in a class for individual animals.
- (4) Boars may not be entered as an exhibit in the swine department unless their tusks have been removed.
- (5) The age of an animal, for purposes of determining its entry class under this chapter, shall be determined as of the opening day of the fair. History: Cr. ATCP 160.08 Class definitions; individual classes.

- (1) Dairy cattle.
 - (a) A spring calf is one born on or after March 1 of the exhibit year.
 - (b) A winter calf is one whose date of birth is between December 1 of the year preceding the exhibit year and February 28 or 29 of the exhibit year.
 - (c) A fall calf is one whose date of birth is between September 1 and November 30 of the year preceding the exhibit year.
 - (d) A summer yearling is one whose date of birth is between June 1 and August 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year.
 - (e) A spring yearling is one whose date of birth is between March 1 and May 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year.
 - (f) A winter yearling is one whose date of birth is between December 1 of the second year preceding the exhibit year and February 28 or 29 of the year preceding the exhibit year.
 - (g) A fall yearling is one whose date of birth is between September 1 and November 30 of the second year preceding the exhibit year.
 - (h) A 2 year-old is one born between September 1 of the third year preceding the exhibit year and August 31 of the second year preceding the exhibit year. A 2-year-old includes a yearling that has freshened.
 - (i)A 3 year-old is one whose date of birth is between September 1 of the fourth year preceding the exhibit year and August 31 of the third year preceding the exhibit year.
 - (j) A 4 year-old is one whose date of birth is between September 1 of the fifth year preceding the exhibit year and August 31 of the fourth year preceding the exhibit year.

(2) Beef cattle.

- (a) A junior calf is one born on or after January 1 of the exhibit year. The calf shall be at least 4 months old at the time of exhibit.
- (b) A senior calf is one whose date of birth is between September 1 and December 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year.
- (c) A summer yearling is one whose date of birth is between May 1 and August 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year.
- (d) A junior yearling is one whose date of birth is between January 1 and April 30 of the year preceding the exhibit year.
- (e) A senior yearling is one whose date of birth is between September 1 and December 31 of the second year preceding the exhibit year.
- (f) A 2 year-old or older cow is one born before September 1 of the second year preceding the exhibit year and which has calved during the past year.

(4) Swine.

- (a) A junior yearling boar or sow is one born between January 1 and June 30 of the year preceding the exhibit year.
- (b)A senior boar or sow is one whose date of birth is between July 1 and December 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year.
- (c)A senior spring boar or sow pig is one whose date of birth is between January 1 and February 28 or 29 of the exhibit year. A fair board may subdivide this entry class into January-born and February-born sows or boars.
- (d)A junior spring boar or sow pig is one born during the month of March of the exhibit year.

(5) Sheep.

- (a) A spring lamb is one born on or after February 16 of the exhibit year.
- (b)A fall lamb is one born between September 1 and December 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year.
- (c)A winter lamb is one born between January 1 and February 15 of the exhibit year.
- (d) A yearling ram or ewe is one born outside the date of birth limitations in pars. (a) through (c). The age of yearlings may be subject to verification by a veterinarian's examination whose findings shall be final. History: Cr. Register, November, 1990, No. 419, eff. 12-1-90; am. ATCP 160.09 Class definitions; group classes.

(1) Dairy and beef cattle.

- (a) A dairy junior get of sire shall consist of 3 animals which are the offspring of the same bull. All of these animals shall be under 2 years of age, and not more than one may be a bull. A beef junior get of sire shall consist of 3 animals which are the offspring of the same bull and are animals in the junior calf, senior calf, or the summer yearling, bull and heifer classes, with both sexes to be represented.
- (b) A dairy and beef senior get of sire shall consist of 3 animals which are the offspring of one sire. All of these animals shall be 2 years of age or over. In either a dairy or beef breed get of sire, the name of the sire shall be designated by the exhibitor. The animals need not be owned by a single exhibitor.
- (c) A produce of dam shall consist of 2 animals of any age or sex which are the produce of one cow.
- (d) A group of 3 best female cattle shall consist of 3 animals of any age which were bred and are owned by the exhibitor.

- (2) Swine. A pen of 3 feeder pigs shall consist of swine of either sex each weighing between 40 and 60 pounds. Any male pigs included in the pen shall be castrated and healed.
- (3) Sheep.
 - (a) A get of sire shall consist of 4 lambs or yearlings, or both, of either sex, from one sire, which were bred and are owned by the exhibitor.
 - (b) An exhibitor's flock shall consist of one yearling or ram lamb, 2 yearling ewes and 2 ewe lambs which are owned by the exhibitor.
 - (c) A junior division pair of lambs may include a spring or fall ram and spring or fall ewe lamb owned by the exhibitor.
 - (d) A junior division flock shall be comprised of 3 sheep consisting of a yearling or lamb ram, a ewe lamb, and a yearling ewe, all of which are owned by the exhibitor. History: Cr. ATCP 160.91 Judging regulations.

- Judging shall be done at fairs by individuals who are registered with the department. In no case shall any person who is an officer or director of a fair be eligible to judge exhibits at such fair; nor shall any person interested directly or indirectly in exhibits shown in any department of a fair be eligible to judge articles or animals in that department.
- (1m)

 (a)An individual shall register by submitting to the department an application. The department shall register all individuals who qualify to be judges, including having the knowledge, training, or experience in the specific classes to be judged and adhering to ethical judging practices. The registration is valid for five years.
 - (b) An individual submitting an application after July 1 may not judge for the current fair year.
 - (c) A fair representative may request the department waive par. (b) in cases of unanticipated emergency situations.
- (2) Each judge at a fair shall be provided with a copy of the fair's premium book or list of entry classes at least 7 days prior to the opening date of the fair.
- (3) No animal or article, irrespective of the number of entries in the class in which it is entered, shall be awarded a higher rating than its merit would entitle it to in comparison to the standard of perfection in the class.(4)
- (a) Danish system judging may be used in the junior fair division. State aid may not be paid on premiums awarded under the Danish system in any other division.
 - (b) When classes in the junior fair division are judged according to the Danish system, 4 group placings shall be awarded in any class. When there are less than 8 exhibitors in the class, there shall not be more than 2 in the first group, not more than 4 in the first 2 groups and not more than 6 in the first 3 groups. If there are 8 or more entries in the class, there shall not be more than 25% in the first group, not more than 50% in the first 2 groups, and not more than 75% in the first 3 groups.
 - (c) The number of awards in the last group placing may be increased to the extent necessary to give awards to all exhibitors.
- (4g) When classes in the junior fair division are judged using the conference judging system, the judge shall use sub. (4) (b) and (c) to award placements in a class.
- If any class of exhibits at a fair is judged according to the regular system, the judges for that class may give only one first-place, one second-place, one third-place and one fourth-place award in that class.

ATCP 160.92 Accounting requirements.

- (1) All receipts from any source whatsoever shall be deposited in a bank, and all accounts without exception shall be paid by check or draft. All records, including judging sheets, papers, stubs, checks, vouchers or other orders relating to fair transactions shall be preserved for a 6-year period subsequent to the year in which they were made or issued.
- (2) Premiums shall be actually paid or bona fide notice of premium awards sent to all premium winners before a claim for state aid may be considered.
- (3) The authorized fair representative claiming state aid shall file with the department within 30 days after the close of the fair, an affidavit which shall include all of the following documents:
 - (a) A list of premiums actually paid or to be paid listed by department.
 - (b) An index of exhibitors and their addresses, with amounts paid in premiums opposite each name.
 - (c) One premium book.
 - (d) A summary of all judges utilized by the fair including their registration numbers.
 - (e) An affidavit from each judge indicating the departments and classes judged at the fair.
 - (f) Horse exhibitors' registrations.
- The authorized fair representative shall submit, on or before January 31 following the year in which the fair is held, the annual financial report verified on oath which shall include the receipts and disbursements, and the fair attendance. State aid received for the current year shall be included as a receipt in the annual financial report.

POLK COUNTY FAIR ANIMAL HEALTH REGULATIONS

- (1) Exhibitors must provide and use only their own utensils and water buckets in caring for livestock. No livestock watering tanks will be allowed on the grounds.
- (2) Animals should be transported in clean and disinfected cars and trucks to and from the fair.
- (3) All interstate health certificates accompanying cattle, equine, sheep, goats, and swine that originate outside of Wisconsin, should be approved by the chief livestock sanitary official of the state of origin prior to exhibition.
- (4) Health records must be delivered to the superintendent the first day of the fair as animals are unloaded at fairgrounds. Animals exhibited should be identified by registration name and number <u>or</u> by ear tag number.
- (5) Decisions of the Dr. V.M. hired by the Polk County Fair Society shall be final.
- (6) All open and junior division exhibitors are expected to abide by these regulations as well as the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture Animal Health Requirements that follow.



Animal Health Regulations

Fairs and Shows in Wisconsin: 2023 Season

This is a summary of animal health requirements for fairs, shows and exhibitions. They are not necessarily the same as requirements for importing animals into Wisconsin or moving them within the state for other purposes. They may change if animal diseases occur in Wisconsin or elsewhere, so always check **datcp.wi.gov** or contact us for current information. Fairs or exhibitions may have additional requirements. Exhibitors should contact the event organizers for more information. Ref. s. ATCP 10.87, Wis. Admin. Code.

General requirements for event organizers

All fairs or exhibitions of any length must obtain, review, and keep for five years all required records and test results:

- Exhibitor's name and address
- Animal identification (number, type, description, and, when required, official identification (see requirements for different animals below))
- Documents showing compliance with disease testing and other health requirements
- Livestock premises number, if any, where animals originated
- Documentation showing legal importation to the event (if applicable) and, when required, movement to the event (see requirements for different animals below)
- For swine, a record of any swine transported directly to a slaughtering establishment
- For swine, a record of any swine transported to an animal market where all animals sold at the market sale for that day were shipped directly to a slaughtering establishment

Fairs or exhibitions lasting more than 24 hours must appoint a licensed veterinarian to inspect all animals daily.

Note: Except in specific circumstances, if an animal already bears an official 840 eartag, that eartag must not be removed and additional official eartags must not be applied. Instead, the existing eartag must be read and recorded when a record of that animal is required. (Ref. s. ATCP 10.045, Wis. Admin. Code)

These regulations apply to all fairs and exhibitions, including additional events (like rodeos, shows, or other organized events) that occur in conjunction with the fair.

Diseases

Animals that show evidence of having contagious or infectious diseases may not be commingled (or housed/kept) with other animals at a fair, show, or other exhibition in such a way as to allow disease to spread. Such animals should not attend the fair, show, or exhibition. Animals may be denied entry if they arrive at these events with contagious or infectious diseases, isolated and/or removed if they develop disease after arriving, or be subject to other action as would be necessary to control disease. (Ref. s. ATCP 10.08(1), Wis. Admin. Code)

Bovine animals with ringworm, mange, warts or scab will be removed from the fair or exhibition premises, unless the veterinarian in charge finds warts or ringworm lesions are incapable of transmitting disease.

Cattle and bison

Cattle from within Wisconsin have no requirements for tests or health documents.

Cattle from outside Wisconsin (Ref. s. ATCP 10.22, Wis. Admin. Code) must:

- Be accompanied by certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or health certificate)^a
 documenting official animal identification (ID) and all required tests and certifications
- Have official individual ID (including steers)^b
- Meet all of Wisconsin's normal requirements for import (see https://datcp.wi.gov/Pages/Programs_Services/CattleBison.aspx)

Acceptable animal IDsb for all cattle from outside Wisconsin

- USDA metal ear tag number that is part of the National Uniform Eartagging System (NUES)
 (starts with state 2-digit code, also known as "brite" tag); this includes the orange brucellosis
 vaccination tag
- 15-digit "840" tags (visual or RFID)
- Valid only if applied before March 11, 2015:
 - o Manufacturer-coded RFID tag 15-digit number with the first three digits in 900s
 - American ID tag 8 to 12-digit number prefaced with "USA"

Brucellosis requirements for cattle from outside Wisconsin

No cattle from outside Wisconsin are currently required to be brucellosis tested or vaccinated to come to fairs and shows in Wisconsin

Tuberculosis (TB) requirements^c for cattle from outside Wisconsin

As of 1/1/23, all cattle from **Texas** and **Michigan's TB Free Zone** (for cattle from Michigan's Modified Accredited Zone see below), regardless of sex or age are required to have a negative TB test within 60 days prior to import.

Cattle from Michigan's Modified Accredited Zone – Alcona, Alpena, Montmorency, and Oscoda counties - (for cattle from Michigan's TB Free Zone, see requirements by state above) also need:

- Import permite
- To originate from a herd that has a negative whole-herd TB test within 12 months before arrival in Wisconsin that includes all animals 1 year and older^c
- Negative individual TB tests within 60 days before entering Wisconsin^c
- A statement indicating the animals will return directly to the state of origin after the show^d.

Swine

Note: These regulations apply to all swine, including pet pigs and racing pigs.

Swine from within Wisconsin (Ref. s. ATCP 10.32(2) and 10.87, Wis. Admin. Code) need a Wisconsin intrastate certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or health certificate)^a:

Note: Herd of origin means the herd in which the pigs currently reside, likely the exhibitor's herd. When pigs are purchased from a herd, the herd from which they originate is the herd of origin for the seller. Once the purchased pigs are added into the buyer's herd (even if the buyer's herd only consists of one or just a few animals), the buyer's herd becomes the new herd of origin and that herd must meet testing requirements to move pigs again.

- Stating that the entire herd of origin was inspected on the farm within 30 days before the show and no apparent disease was present at the time of inspection^d.
- Non-terminal Exhibitions: All swine must have a PRRS (Porcine Reproductive and Respiratory Syndrome) and PEDv (Porcine Epidemic Diarrhea virus) test of the herd of origin within 90 days of the exhibition^c. Include test date, type, and results on the CVI.
- Terminal Exhibitions: No testing requirements.c

Note: Terminal Exhibitions are those at which all the swine go directly from the fair/show to the slaughtering establishment OR to a slaughter only market sale. If going to a slaughter only market sale, contact the Division of Animal Health fair inspector for required information to collect.

Note: If the fair intends to use a load-out facility, contact the Division of Animal Health in advance to discuss requirements that must be met.

Swine from outside Wisconsin (Ref. s. ATCP 10.30 and 10.87, Wis. Admin. Code) need a certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or health certificate)^a that includes the following:

- The negative results of the PRRS test^c from the swine's herd of origin conducted within 90 days prior to movement into Wisconsin including test date, type, and results.
- The negative results of the PEDv test^c from the swine's herd of origin conducted within 90 days prior to movement into Wisconsin including test date, type, and results.
- A statement that the veterinarian has inspected the entire herd of origin within the past 30 days and that no clinical signs of PRRS and PEDv or any other apparent disease was present at the time of inspection.^d
- Official individual identification (ID)^b

Acceptable methods of ID for swine areb:

- USDA silver ear tag
- USDA 840 ear tag, either visual or RFID
- Breed association tattoo if the pig is a purebred and the tattoo is registered
- An ear tag with the premises identification number and a unique identifier
- Ear notch if the pig is a purebred and the notch is registered

Note: Microchips are not accepted as official ID for any swine including pet pigs.

Sheep and goats

Note: These rules do not apply to non-domestic sheep and goats. See Exotic Ruminants below.

Sheep and goats from within Wisconsin need:

- If sexually intact, need official individual identification (ID)^b at any age.
- If not sexually intact, need official individual IDb if they are 12 months or older.
- See below for Official ID options.
- Sheep and goats that go to a market or slaughter establishment after the fair should have an owner hauler statement to move from the fair to the market/slaughter establishment.

Sheep and goats from outside Wisconsin (Ref. s.ATCP 10.69, 10.76, Wis. Admin. Code) need:

- Certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or health certificate)^a and official individual ID^b for all animals.
- See below for Official ID options.
- See below for additional requirements for goats from Michigan's Tuberculosis Modified Accredited Zone.
- Sheep and goats that go to a market or slaughter establishment after the fair should have an owner hauler statement to move from the fair to the market/slaughter establishment.

Official Identification^b includes:

- Scrapie eartags (including tags on neckstraps for animals with absent/injured ears or with official tattoos – see DATCP Website*)
- USDA 840 ear tags
- Legible breed tattoos (see DATCP Website* and NOTE below)
- Legible scrapie tattoos (see DATCP Website* and NOTE below)
- Approved microchips (Electronic Identification/EID) There are many requirements that need to be met to use microchips including a requirement for accompanying tattoos. See DATCP Website* and NOTE below.
- NOTE: All sheep and goats that go through a market or to slaughter and require
 Official Identification must be eartagged with Official ID. Official ID in the form of a tattoo
 or Electronic Implantable Identification (EID) is no longer sufficient when moving through a
 market or going to slaughter.
- **NOTE:** If a Wisconsin origin animal is neutered, less than 12 months of age, and moving through a market after the fair, the market may require Official ID in the form of an ear tag.

Goats from Michigan's Tuberculosis (TB) Modified Accredited Zone –Alcona, Alpena, Montmorency, Oscoda counties- also need:

- Import permite
- To originate from a herd that has a negative whole-herd TB test within 12 months before arrival in Wisconsin that includes all animals 1 year and older^c
- Negative individual TB tests within 60 days before entering Wisconsin^c
- A statement indicating the animals will return directly to the state of origin after the show.^d

Equine

Equine animals from within Wisconsin need documentation of a negative EIA (Coggins) test^c done within the previous 12 months, which clearly identifies the animal by complete description, digital photographs, or an approved microchip (if a reader is available). No test is needed for nursing foals accompanying negative dams. Documentation may be:

- Official test report VS 10-11, or
- USDA-approved electronic test form, or
- Global Vet Link EIA electronic form, or
- Certificate of veterinary inspection with the test results listed

Equine animals from outside Wisconsin (Ref. s.ATCP 10.36, Wis. Admin. Code) need:

- Certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or health certificate)^a which clearly identifies^b the animal by complete description, digital photographs, or an approved microchip
- Negative EIA (Coggins) test^c done within previous 12 months that is reported on the CVI
- No EIA test is needed for nursing foals accompanying negative dams

Equines from Minnesota are exempt from the CVI requirement if:

- Ownership does not change while the animal is in Wisconsin
- The animal remains in Wisconsin no longer than 7 days
- Proof of a negative EIA (Coggins) test^c in previous 12 months accompanies the animal

Poultry and waterfowl (Pigeons are not considered poultry for fairs and shows)

Poultry and waterfowl from within Wisconsin need ONE of the following:

- An NPIP certificate stating the flock of origin is a US pullorum-typhoid clean and for turkeys a Mycloplasma gallisepticum clean flock or NPIP affiliate flock^c or
- Documentation the flock of origin is a Wisconsin Tested Flock and has tested negative for pullorum-typhoid and for turkeys Mycoplasma gallisepticum,^c or
- Documentation the flock of origin is a Wisconsin Associate Flock^c, or
- Individual tests for sexually mature birds (turkeys over 6 months, all other birds over 4 months) within 90 days before arrival at the show. These birds also need wing or leg band identification (ID). All birds must test negative for pullorum-typhoid, and turkeys must test negative for *Mycoplasma gallisepticum*. After testing there can be no change of ownership or commingling with other birds that are not part of the flock except at other shows/fairs.

Note: Flock of origin means the flock in which the birds currently reside, likely the exhibitor's flock. Once purchased birds are added to the buyer's flock, even if the buyer's flock only consists of one or just a few birds, the buyer's flock is the flock of origin and that flock must meet NPIP or WI Tested or Associate Flock status to avoid individual bird testing for shows/fairs.

Poultry and waterfowl from outside Wisconsin (Ref. s.ATCP 10.42, Wis. Admin. Code) need a certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or health certificate)^a or equivalent (such as form VS 9-3) specifically showing movement to the fair or show that states:

- They originate from a flock classified pullorum-typhoid clean and for turkeys *Mycoplasma gallisepticum* clean under NPIP or an equivalent state program^c, *or*
- If they are sexually mature, that they have tested negative for pullorum-typhoid (and *Mycoplasma gallisepticum* for turkeys) within 90 days^c before arrival at the show. These birds also need wing or leg band ID^b.

Not required:

Import permit number

Exotic Ruminants

Note: Exotic ruminants are ruminants that are not native to Wisconsin, and are not cervids – for example, Old World camels, yaks, water buffalo, pronghorn antelope, giraffes, and non-domestic sheep and goats. In addition, please contact your county and local municipality for any restrictions.

Exotic ruminants from within Wisconsin have no requirements.

Exotic ruminants from outside Wisconsin (Ref. s.ATCP 10.82, Wis. Admin. Code) must have

- Certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or health certificate)^a
- Official individual identification (ID) as required for tuberculosis and brucellosis testing^b
- Import permite
- Proof written on the CVI that they meet requirements for:
 - Tuberculosis (TB) negative test required within 60 days before entry^c
 - Brucellosis negative test required within 30 days before entry^c

Please call 608-224-4872 beforehand to determine which TB test to use.

South American camelids: Ilamas, alpacas, guanacos, vicuñas

South American camelids from within Wisconsin have no requirements.

South American camelids from outside Wisconsin (Ref. s.ATCP 10.85, Wis. Admin. Code) must have a certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or health certificate)^a and official individual identification (ID)^b. Official ID may be:

- Approved USDA ear tag number
- Microchip number
- Breed association registration number
- Breed association tattoo

Requirements are subject to change as conditions warrant. For current information, check https://datcp.wi.gov/Pages/Programs_Services/LlamaAlpacaMovement.aspx.

Small animals: Dogs, domestic cats, and other household pets (ferrets, pet birds, rabbits, gerbils, guinea pigs, hamsters, domestic mice and rats)

Note: For animals that are part of menageries, see also rules below for menageries. Pot-bellied and miniature pigs fall under rules for swine. Dog hybrids, domestic cat hybrids, or exotic small cat species such as servals fall under rules for Exotic small animals. Native wild animals and birds, including raptors, and captive wild animals such as raccoons, opossums, and skunks fall under rules for wild animals.

Dogs from within Wisconsin (Ref. s.95.21, Wis. Stats.) that are 5 months or older need proof of current rabies vaccination.^f

Cats and other household pets from within Wisconsin have no requirements.

Dogs and cats from outside Wisconsin (Ref. s.ATCP 10.80, Wis. Admin. Code) that are 5 months or older need to be vaccinated against rabies^f by a licensed veterinarian, and regardless of age, need certificates of veterinary inspection (CVIs or health certificates)^a stating the age of the animal and for animals 5 months and older the date of last rabies vaccination and revaccination due date.

Other household pets from outside Wisconsin (Ref. s.ATCP 10.06, Wis. Admin. Code) need certificates of veterinary inspection (CVIs or health certificates)^a but have no testing or vaccination requirements.

Small animals from other nations need to meet requirements of the U.S. Department of Agriculture (608-662-0600) and Centers for Disease Control (1-800-232-4636).

Exotic small animals (any species not covered by "small animals" above), exotic large animals, and other wild animals

Note: Local jurisdictions may have requirements beyond the state requirements listed here.

Animals from within Wisconsin do not have any requirements as long as they are legally possessed in Wisconsin.^f

Animals from outside Wisconsin (Ref. s.ATCP 10.84, Wis. Admin. Code) generally have no testing or vaccination requirements, but do need:

- Certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or health certificate)^a
- Import permit numbere

Note: Some animals may not be brought to Wisconsin. These are North American prairie dogs and the following African species: tree squirrels, rope squirrels, dormice, Gambian giant pouched rats, brush-tailed porcupines and striped mice. Some animals may require permits from the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources. See http://dnr.wi.gov.

Circus, rodeo, racing and menagerie animals

Note: Local jurisdictions may have requirements beyond the state requirements listed here.

Animals from within Wisconsin must meet vaccination and testing requirements for their species. See these requirements earlier in this document.

Animals from outside Wisconsin need certificates of veterinary inspection (CVIs or health certificates) and vaccinations, identification, and tests required for their species. See these requirements earlier in this document.

They also need import permit numbers^e (Ref. s.ATCP 10.81, Wis. Admin. Code) if they are:

- Circuses and individual circus acts
- Rodeo stock other than individual participants' horses
- Multi-species menageries (defined as any animals kept in a collection primarily for purposes of exhibition or competition)
- Petting zoos

They do not need import permit numbers if they are:

- Rodeo horses owned by individual participants
- Single-species groups

Note: Some animals may not be brought to Wisconsin. These are North American prairie dogs and the following African species: tree squirrels, rope squirrels, dormice, Gambian giant pouched rats, brush-tailed porcupines and striped mice. Some animals may require permits from the Department of Natural Resources. See https://dnr.wi.gov/topic/wildlifehabitat/captive.html

Guidelines for housing and managing animals

The State Veterinarian recommends that exhibitors:

- Vaccinate breeding cattle against bovine viral diarrhea (BVD) at least 30 days before the event
- Test cattle for BVD-PI by immunoperoxidase test, and bring them to shows only if they test negative
- Test cattle for Johne's disease by ELISA test, and bring them to shows only if they test negative
- Clean and disinfect vehicles used to transport animals to and from the show, and vehicles used on the grounds before, during, and after the show
- Isolate exhibited animals returning to their farms or animals purchased at the show for 21 days before mingling them with other stock

The State Veterinarian recommends that show organizers:

- · House cattle separately from South American camelids and other exotic ruminants
- House cattle separately from small ruminants, especially sheep
- House ostriches, emus, rheas and cassowaries separately from domestic poultry
- House swine separately from any other mammals
- Include a space for the premises registration code on livestock entry forms
- Provide hand-washing stations near all livestock facilities
- Provide individual watering and feeding troughs rather than common ones

Polk County Fair Livestock Exhibitor's Code of Ethics

Exhibitors of animals in livestock, poultry and small animal shows shall at all times conduct themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agricultural education. This code applies to junior as well as open class exhibitors who compete in structured classes of competition.

By entering an animal for exhibition at the Polk County Fair, the exhibitor consents to abide by the following guidelines:

- 1. All exhibitors must present, upon request of fair and livestock show officials, proof of ownership, managerial agreement, length of ownership and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of ownership, age, or any facts relating thereto is prohibited.
- 2. Owners and exhibitors shall provide animal health certificates from licensed veterinarians as required by the Animal Health Rules and Regulations of the Polk County Fair.
- Junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at the Polk County Fair. The
 clipping and grooming of animals while on the fairgrounds is to be done by the exhibitor and can be
 assisted by immediate family members, including Polk County 4-H Leaders, FFA advisors or owners
- 4. Animals shall be presented to show events where they will enter the food chain free of drugs. The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, or other substances from the animal to be used in testing.
 - 5. Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug which could affect the animals' performance or alter its natural contour, confirmation, or appearance, is prohibited. Exceptions will be made for external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only and for surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal.
- 6. The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance, or other similar practices are not acceptable and are prohibited.
- 7. Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair or livestock show management, other exhibitors, or show officials before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair and livestock show management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.
- 8. No owner, exhibitor, shall conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of ethics.
- 9. The act of entering of an animal in the Polk County Fair implies that the owner, exhibitor, has read this Code of Ethics and agrees to abide by these provisions.
- 10. No Quality Meats animal can be moved from the appropriate exhibit barn and housed in a different location during the fair.

Junior Division

Includes 4-H, FFA, FHA, Scout members and any other youth organization having adult leadership.

NOTICE TO ALL JUNIOR DIVISION EXHIBITORS

- 1. This division is open to all boys and girls ages **8 through 19 as of January 1, current exhibit year**, who are members of 4-H, FFA, FHA, Scouts, and Youth Organizations in Polk County. All students in schools in Polk County or residents of Polk County, grades 3-12, can enter in Department 35J. **School work should be entered in Department 35J.**
- 2. Youth group members may enter in Junior Division or Open Division, but not both. Youth enrolled in the Cloverbud program in order to be recognized as Cloverbuds must show in the Junior Division. If they choose to show as an open exhibitor, they cannot show in the junior division.
- 3. All exhibits must be this year's work of member exhibiting. Members may enter only in projects enrolled in this year.
- 4. Entries are to be made under name of club, chapter, or organization. An exhibitor entering exhibits under more than one youth organization should complete an entry form for exhibits under each organization. <u>CAUTION</u>: An exhibitor may not enter more than one exhibit under any one lot number. Each exhibitor is limited to a maximum of twenty three (23) entries. Adult leader or instructor's recommendation will be required of each exhibitor by signature on the entry form. A 4-H leader cannot sign for FFA or FHA exhibits and an Ag-Ed instructor or Family Living instructor cannot sign for 4-H exhibits.
- 5. Exhibitors must turn in their completed entry form to leaders or instructors for checking and signature. The Leaders' or instructor's signature on the fair entry form verifies that the exhibitor is enrolled in the project (rule 3 above). All entries from a club, chapter, troop or group should be submitted together with complete youth organization summary form.
- 6. No entry fee will be charged in this division. Each exhibitor in this department is required to purchase <u>only</u> one Junior Exhibitor's season ticket at a cost of \$6.00.
- 7. Please do not use pencils, magic markers or felt pens to fill out entry forms.
- 8. <u>Junior exhibitors must enter Music, Drama, Dance Revue, Computer Revue, Clothing Revue, Dog Show, Cat Show, Pet Pals, Cavies, Speaking & Demonstrations, Shooting Sports Event, and Aerospace Fly-Off, on entry form to be eligible for premiums. These events are held prior to the fair. Please see the "Clover Connection" or the Extension website for more details, or call 715.485.8600.</u>
- 9. Exhibits may be removed after 4:30 p.m. on the last day of the fair.
- 10. <u>JUDGING:</u> Exhibitors should check the judging schedules at the end of fair book to see the date, time, and type of judging (conference or Danish).
- 11. State statutes regarding consumption and possession of alcoholic beverages will be enforced at the fairgrounds. Any exhibitor found in violation of the statute will not receive premiums earned.
- 12. Read liability notice on page 13.
- 13. Do not bring exhibits prior to 1 p.m. on Wednesday of current exhibit year. Fair officials are not responsible for exhibits brought in earlier than that time. All exhibits must be brought to the appropriate building or conference judging area on Wednesday of current exhibit year between 1 p.m. and 7 p.m.

The following are exceptions to this requirement:

- a. Junior, Open and Senior citizen flowers and house plants (Dept. 15J, 15 and 150) must be in place by 6 p.m. on Wednesday of current exhibit year.
- b. Dairy and llamas must be unloaded and stalled by noon on Thursday of current exhibit year. These animals may be brought in on Wednesday if desired.
- c. Hogs must be unloaded and in pens by 6 p.m. on Wednesday of current exhibit year.
- 14. Additional breed recognition may be awarded to exhibitor. Opportunities will be posted in barn.
- 15. Please refer to the specific Dept/Class for any additional rules/requirements/restrictions for participation.

NOTICE TO ALL LIVESTOCK, ANIMAL AND POULTRY EXHIBITORS

- 1. Dairy, beef, horse, sheep, swine and goats stall rent see page 11 of this book for amounts (include fees with your entry).
- 2. Vehicles are not to be parked around barns on Friday through Sunday. Park in designated areas only.
- 3. Refer to health regulations printed in the front part of this book. Read them carefully and follow them accordingly. Decisions of the fair employed D.V.M. are final.
- 4. All livestock must be owned or under managerial agreement between the owner and exhibitor. Animals must be shown by person who made the entry. In the case of an emergency, contact superintendent for permission to get a substitute show person.
- 5. All animals must be trained to lead and be under control of exhibitor or they will not be permitted in the show ring.
- 6. Any exhibitor not caring for livestock exhibit(s) shall be disqualified by the fair superintendents and/or directors from receiving premium money.
- 7. Club Herdsmanship awards will be given to dairy, beef, swine, sheep, goats and horses. Judging will be based on originality, cleanliness, responsible animal care and exhibitor courtesy.

Exhibitors are prohibited from bringing extra fans or generators into the barns.

Protocol for Management of Livestock Care Issues

- 9. Report the name of the exhibitor to the barn superintendent.
- 10. The barn superintendent will notify a livestock committee member and they will verify that the animal is not being care for
- 11. The exhibitor and the parents will be talked to by the superintendent and a livestock committee member(s). The discussion will be documented.
- 12. Observe to see if behavior is correct.
- 13. Consult with fair vet.
- 14. Allow for a grievance hearing to take place before the premiums are withheld.

Dairy Show Saturday of current exhibit year beginning @ 9:00 am

The clipping and grooming of dairy animals by exhibitors while on the fairgrounds is to be done by the exhibitor and can be assisted by immediate family members, including Polk County 4-H Dairy leaders, and/or FFA advisor, or owner. All animals entering the judging ring must be shown by a junior exhibitor.

REGISTRATION PAPERS WILL BE CHECKED AT THE FAIR Purebred animals must follow the guidelines set forth by their breed organization.

All exhibitors showing purebred animals must submit all pedigree and identification information for each purebred animal to be shown with their fair entry form on the supplemental form provided. Exhibitors of grade animals must submit as much identification and pedigree information as known. This information is essential for the dairy show catalog. Any changes must be completed by the change deadline—July 3 of the current exhibit year. This includes changes or completion of pedigree and identification information for purebred classes. The dairy committee reserves the right to verify that the correct animal is exhibited as entered. NO substitutions allowed after the change deadline.

A Spring Calf is one born on or after March 1 of the exhibit year.

A Winter Calf is one whose date of birth is between December 1 of the year preceding the exhibit year and February 28 or 29 of the exhibit year.

A Fall Calf is one whose date of birth is between September 1 and November 30 of the year preceding the exhibit year.

A Summer Yearling is one whose date of birth is between June 1 and August 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year.

A Spring Yearling is one whose date of birth is between March 1 and May 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year.

A Winter Yearling is one whose date of birth is between December 1 of the second year preceding the exhibit year and February 28 or 29 of the year preceding the exhibit year.

A Fall Yearling is one whose date of birth is between September 1 and November 30 of the second year preceding the exhibit year.

A Junior 2 Year old is one born during the period March 1 to August 31 of the second year preceding the exhibit year. Yearlings that have freshened should be entered in this lot number.

A Senior 2 Year old is one born during the period September 1 of the third year preceding the exhibit year to February 28 of the second year preceding the exhibit year.

A 3 Year old is one whose date of birth is between September 1 of the fourth year preceding the exhibit year and August 31 of the third year preceding the exhibit year.

A 4 year old is one whose date of birth is between September 1 of the fifth year preceding the exhibit year and August 31 of the fourth year preceding the exhibit year.

A 5 Year old and over is one born prior to September 1 of the fifth year preceding the exhibit year.

Any dry cow must have completed at least one lactation.

Attention Exhibitors of Milking Cows: The milking facilities at the Polk County fair park are provided for your use and convenience. These facilities have been paid for and are maintained through proceeds from the sale of milk produced during the county fair each year. Other improvements to the dairy exhibit area at the fair park are also made using these funds. ATCP60.12 (2) prohibits milk from being transported from the fair park back to a farm. This rule is designed to protect the quality and safety of milk.

<u>Best Uddered Cows:</u> A rosette ribbon will be awarded to the best uddered cow in each milking cow lot number when cows in that lot are shown. Dry cows are not eligible for this ribbon.

Cash awards will be presented to selected dairy champions. These awards will be announced the day of the dairy show. Special thanks to the agribusinesses that have generously supported this effort.

- 12. Any **UNSPORTSMANLIKE CONDUCT** by an exhibitor or guardian will result in dismissal from remaining horse events at the fair, and loss of premiums.
- 13. You may be asked to leave by the barn superintendent if the horse barn rules are not followed.
- 14. Stall deposits will be returned IF the horse has remained at the fair until 4:30 p.m. on Sunday, AND the stall has been cleaned.

Horse Show Rules

- 1. ALL Jr Horse Show exhibitors MUST meet the current Polk Co 4H project "Qualifications to show at Fair" for the given year. Please refer to the current Polk Co 4H Horse project book for details.
- 2. Grade of exhibitor is as of January 1 of current exhibit year.
- 3. Fair entry guidelines. All exhibitors taking part in any premium class must fill in a project entry form through the county superintendent of entries by their specified deadline. At fair, any discrepancies will be checked through the superintendent of entries and rider will be added to class only as a non-premium rider and will not be eligible for placings in class if they have not entered into the correct lot number.
- 4. NO DOGS ALLOWED ON FAIRGROUNDS DURING THE FAIR, INCLUDING IN THE CAMPING AREA
- 5. No tandem riding at any 4-H event or on grounds of show.
- 6. Stallions foaled before January 1 of current exhibit year are not allowed.
- 7. Suckling foals will be allowed in the show ring only when being shown. When not being shown, they must be tied or confined.
- 8. Strap on spurs are optional. Slip on spurs are not allowed. Whips are not allowed in Showmanship (English or Western).

- 10. For gymkhana rules, go to: http://fyi.uwex.edu/wi4haganimalscience/wi-4-h-horse-assn-handbook/
- 11. Exhibitors may show a maximum of two horses, but no more than one horse per lot number.
- 12. A horse may be used only once in any class at the show. Grade levels are considered class divisions and not separate events. Exceptions to this rule are horses used in the horseless horse project, or a horse used in showmanship by two exhibitors of the same family.
- 13. All judged events qualify for the State Horse Expo EXCEPT Novices classes and Walk/Trot Classes. To qualify for the State Horse Expo, exhibitor must receive a blue at the county fair in a qualifying class, and be in the sixth grade or older. (There are no age limits for the educational classes at the State Horse Expo).
- 14. To show at the District Gymkhana, exhibitor must have met requirements to show at the fair, and be in the sixth grade or older.
- 15. To show at the State Gymkhana, exhibitor must have met requirements to show at the fair and be in the sixth grade or older.
- 16. Walk/Trot classes are for those exhibitors who are not comfortable loping. If the horse/rider combination has won a blue ribbon in walk/trot at a previous fair, they should be in a loping class.
- 17. If an exhibitor is entered in a walk/trot class, they may not enter in a loping class.
- 18. Proof of negative current exhibit year Coggins test is required. BRING A COPY TO THE FAIR.
- 19. Horseless horse lot numbers are 101, 107, 108, 111, and 112.
- 20. All participants must wear a helmet that is ASTM/SEI approved. All riders are required to wear helmets at any time that they are mounted inside or outside of the show arena.
- 21. When mounted on horse you must use saddle and bridle. (no bareback or riding with halter only).
- 22. Boots are required for riding and working with horse. Boots must have cut out heel for riding.

Horse Show Rules (cont'd)

23. All exhibitors are strongly encouraged to present their horse in showmanship and enter in 1 rail class to be eligible to show in any other horse classes at the fair.

JUMPING CLASSES

You will enter these classes on Thursday morning of the fair. Danish judging for ribbons only, no premiums. **Entries close at 10:00 a.m. on Thursday.** No further entries will be added after that time. Participants must pass a qualifying test sponsored by the Polk County Horse and Pony project prior to the fair in order to participate in this exhibition class. Clinician will determine class specification and which class participants will exhibit in.

A riders ONLY – If you enter any A Jumping Class you may NOT enter any B & C with that horse (Fences will be 2'6" to 3'0")

B riders ONLY – If you enter any B Jumping Class you may not enter any A & C with that horse (Fences will be 2'3" to 2'6")

C riders ONLY – If you enter any C Jumping Class you may NOT enter any A & B with that horse (Fences will be 18" to 2')

TACK AND ATTIRE:

- 1. SEI equine approved safety helmets (with safety harness securely fastened) must be worn at all times when exhibitor is riding on the show grounds.
- 2. Jumping vests are encouraged.
- 3. Boots with heels and appropriate tack must be used when mounted on show grounds.
- 4. An English type saddle with stirrups is compulsory at all levels.
- 5. Proper attire consisting of tall field boots or paddock boots, breeches, and show shirt are required.

OBSTACLE JUMPING:

Each rider will have 45 seconds to complete their pattern. Points will be assigned to each jump. At the bell the rider enters the ring and takes the jumps in any order they choose. They may not jump the same jump without separating it by a different jump. If a rail is knocked down that jump is out of the rotation for that rider.

WORKING HUNTER OVER FENCES:

- 1. A hunter course shall be a fair test of a hunter, with a minimum of 4 obstacles.
- 2. Horse to jump a maximum of 8 fences.
- 3. One change of direction is mandatory.
- 4. The top element of all fences must be securely placed so that a light rub will not cause a knockdown.
- 5. The class will be judged on manners, way of going, and style of jumping.
- 6. Horse shall be credited with maintaining an even hunting pace that covers the course with free flowing strides.
- 7. Preference will be shown to horses with correct jumping style that meets fences squarely, jumping at the center of the fence.
- 8. Judge shall penalize unsafe jumping and bad form over fences, whether touched or untouched, including: twisting, incorrect leads around the ends of the course, or cross-cantering.
- 9. Ins and outs must be taken in the correct number of strides or be penalized.
- 10. Any error which endangers the horse or rider, particularly refusals or knockdowns, shall be heavily penalized.

Poultry Show is Friday of current exhibit year @ 9:00 a.m.

The Poultry Show will kick off with a mandatory meeting at the Poultry Barn on Friday of current exhibit year at 8:30 a.m. Judging will begin at 9:00 a.m.

It is suggested exhibitors lock cages, except on judging day. Exhibitors must provide own metal, plastic or glass water and feed containers. Please attach your containers to the cage or be sure they are non-tippable. NO PAPER CONTAINERS, PLEASE. Health papers are to be turned into the barn superintendent before birds are placed in cages. There should be **NO supplies left in the walkway**.

Poultry and waterfowl from within Wisconsin need:

- An NPIP certificate stating that the birds originate from a US Pullorum-typhoid clean or NPIP affiliate flock and turkeys must test negative for Mycoplasma gallisepticum, or
- A DATCP-issued certificate stating they are from a Wisconsin Tested or Associate Flock and turkeys must test negative for Mycoplasma gallisepticum,
 Or
- Individually test sexually mature birds within 90 days before arrival at the show. These birds also need wing or leg band ID. All birds must test negative for pullorum-typhoid, and turkeys must test negative for *Mycoplasma gallisepticum*.

Poultry and waterfowl from outside Wisconsin need a certificate of veterinary inspection of equivalent (such as form VS 9-3) that states:

- They originate from a flock classified Pullorum-typhoid clean under NPIP or an equivalent state program and turkeys must test negative for Mycoplasma gallisepticum, or
- If they are sexually mature, that they have tested negative for Pullorum-typhoid (and Mycoplasma gallisepticum for turkeys) within 90 days before arrival at the show. These birds also need wing or leg band ID

Not required:

Import permit number

Requirements are subject to change as conditions warrant. For current information, check https://datcp.wi.gov/Pages/Programs Services/PoultryMovement.aspx.

Please watch for updates on Facebook - Polk County Fair Official 4-H Poultry and Clover Connection. The Poultry Committee will not provide testing for turkeys. You will need to make other arrangements. Please be aware that poultry need to be at least 4 months of age to test, except for turkeys which need to be 6 months or older.

Absolutely no changes to entry can be made after the Change Date that the Superintendent of Entries sets. You may drop a class. You may also show in a lot that you aren't signed up for, but it will be for ribbon only.

We will be having an Individual Cage Decorating Contest! Cages will be judged Thursday evening. Winner to be announced at the Poultry Show.

A rabbit can only be shown once. During the rabbit show, anyone who has a scheduling conflict with showing their rabbit (except for the Showmanship class), please contact the Rabbit Barn Superintendent, and then arrange to have someone else show for you. Make sure this person has a card with your entry number on it. Make sure your substitute knows which cage the rabbit to be shown is in. Health requirements are to be enforced. During judging the judge has the right to disqualify any rabbit that has health issues and send the rabbit home immediately.

Face-to-Face Judging on Friday CLASS A: AEROSPACE SECTION

BUILDING MODELS

Examples of kits that can be used, AMA Cub, Thermal Dart, Delta Dart, Pigeon, Flip. All rocket models must have individually attached fins, Estes Model Rocket Kits and/or Quest Model Rocket Kits are used in this section. Each model entered must be identified with the name of the exhibitor and the year built (permanent). Airplanes and rockets should have a stand, when displayed at the fair, to prevent breakage, and to make better use of display area.

All models under aerospace categories must be displayed at the Polk County Fair to receive premiums, unless excused by 4-H Agent Lindsay Spindler. All lot numbers must be entered on fair entry form to be eligible for premiums. Showmanship models do not have to be the ones flown at contest. Premiums are identical for all aerospace lot numbers. For questions, contact Lindsay Spindler, 4-H Youth Development Agent, at 485-8607

For model rocket launching, each exhibitor will be allowed 2 launches for each lot number. The best launch will determine ribbon placing and premiums.

I. FLIGHT PERFORMANCE CATEGORY

To get ribbons and premiums in lot numbers 1-17 and 23-28, flying and launching sessions will be held at Polk County Fair Park pre-fair. **Fly-off dates this year are:** Sunday July 10th @ 2pm; championship fly-off is July 10th, as well. You must register to fly. If you have questions, contact Matt Babcock 612-308-8885. Rain/Weather date will be Sunday July 17th at 2:00 pm.

To qualify for the championship model airplane and model rocket fly-off in lots 1-17 you must fly three categories: hand launch, catapult launch, and rubber powered. Lots 23-28 must fly two categories: target accuracy and parachute duration, an exhibitor must have attended one of the first two sessions and earned at least one blue ribbon in any of the model airplane or model rocket lot numbers from1-17 and 23-28.

<u>Lot numbers 1-17 -</u> are for flying model airplanes. Judging will be according to time in air (duration) after a model is released from the exhibitor's hand or from a tow line - (free flight only). At least one attempt must be made to qualify for a ribbon and premiums in each lot number. NOTE: The same glider can be used in both hand launch and catapult flying. Also a rubber powered model can be used in both hand launch and R.O. G. (Rise off Ground). Equipped with a landing gear, (gear can be removed for the hand launch flights). Wingspan is wing tip to wing tip. Ready to fly models are not allowed. A green ribbon will be awarded for times that are double the requirement for a blue ribbon.

<u>Lot numbers 23-27</u> - are for model rocket launching for accuracy. Judging is based on the following: Safety - 25 points; Construction, 25 points; Launching, 25 points; Recovery deployment, 25 points; and Launch accuracy, 100 points. One point will be subtracted from 100 for each foot a rocket lands away from either the launch pad or the outer edge of a randomly placed target bull's eye, (10 foot radius). Best 1 of 2 launches. All target rocket to deploy at last 10 feet above the ground, determined by the judge.

Scoring for Ribbons:

Blue – 150-200 points; Red 100 – 149 points; White – 50 – 99 points; Pink – less than 50 points. A green ribbon will be awarded for a bull's eye.

At the championship session:

Model airplane flyers will be allowed two attempts to accomplish their best single time in each of three categories: hand launch gliders, catapult gliders and a rubber powered model of their choosing. Their best total time in the three categories will determine their placing for champion.

<u>Model rocket launchers</u> will only be allowed one official launch in each of the two categories: target accuracy and parachute duration. The combined points of the two categories will determine their placing for champion. A first year and advanced champion will be crowned in both model aero plane flying and model rocket launching. Showmanship:

Points are based on you and your projects appearance, and your knowledge of the project.

Explorers when entering lot 1, hand launch, then showmanship 20 - lot 9, rubber power, then showmanship 21 - lot 23, rocket then showmanship 29. **First Year Exhibitor:** May take only lots 1, 5, 7 and showmanship categories that apply.

Robot does a portion of the challenge on the first try = 10 points and requires second and third try to complete the challenge (add 10 points) for a total of 20 points. If Robot cannot complete the challenge after third, try 15 points total will be awarded.

POLK COUNTY REVISED STANDARDIZED RECIPES

<u>DIRECTIONS</u>: The 4-H Foods Committee recommended using standardized recipes to make the county fair judging more uniform and fair. These recipes can be used for fair book items numbered 1-18.

1. Muffins, Plain

2 cups flour

2 teaspoons baking powder

1/2 teaspoon salt

2 tablespoons sugar

1 cup milk

1/4 cup melted butter

1 egg, beaten

Combine flour, baking powder, salt and sugar in medium bowl. Mix well. In a large measuring cup, measure milk. Add butter. Add egg and beat with a fork. Add to dry ingredients. Stir only until well moistened. Spoon dough into the greased muffin tins, filling two-thirds full. Bake at 400 degrees for 20 to 25 minutes. Serve hot with butter. This recipe makes 12 muffins.

2. <u>Muffins, Blueberry</u>

Follow No. 1. - Muffins, plain except increase sugar to 1/2 cup and fold in 1/2 to 1 cup fresh or frozen blueberries.

3. Muffins, Banana-Bran

Follow No. 1. - Muffins, plain except reduce flour to 1 1/2 cups and add 1 cup bran flakes and 1/2 cup mashed banana. Use brown sugar.

4. Cookies, Chocolate Chip

1/3 cup shortening 1 1/2 cups all-purpose flour

1/3 cup butter or margarine, softened 1/2 teaspoon soda 1/2 cup granulated sugar 1/2 teaspoon salt

1/2 cup brown sugar (packed) 1 package (6 ounces) semi-sweet chocolate pieces

1 egg

1 teaspoon vanilla

Pre-heat your oven to 375 degrees. In a large bowl, cream together shortening, butter, sugars, egg and vanilla. Stir in flour, soda and salt. Mix in chocolate chips. Drop by teaspoonfuls 2 inches apart onto ungreased baking sheet. Bake about 8-10 minutes or until light brown.

5. <u>Cookies, Peanut Butter</u>

1 cup peanut butter1 teaspoon vanilla1 cup shortening2-1/2 cups flour1 cup brown sugar1 teaspoon soda1 cup white sugar1 teaspoon salt

2 eggs

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Mix shortening, sugars, peanut butter and eggs. Add vanilla; mix. Add sifted dry ingredients and mix well. Roll about a tablespoon of dough into a ball and press down with a fork. Bake at 350 degrees for 12-15 minutes.

6. Cookies, Spritz

1 cup soft butter 1 teaspoon flavoring (almond or vanilla)

2/3 cup sugar 2 1/2 cups flour

3 egg yolks

Pre-heat your oven to 400 degrees. Mix butter, sugar, egg yolks and flavoring thoroughly. Measure and work in flour. Using one-fourth at a time, force dough through cookie press onto ungreased baking sheet in desired shapes. Bake 7 to 10 minutes, or until set but not brown. This recipe makes about 6 dozen cookies.

7. Cookies, Sugar

1 cup butter or margarine 4 1/4 cups flour 1 cup cooking oil 1 teaspoon salt 1 cup white sugar 1 teaspoon soda

1 cup powdered sugar 1 teaspoon cream of tartar

2 eggs

1 teaspoon vanilla

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Beat first four ingredients very well with an electric mixer. Add one egg at a time and beat well after each. Add flour and other ingredients. Mix well. Make balls the size of a walnut and roll in white sugar. Press lightly on cookie sheet with glass dipped in sugar. Bake for 8 to 10 minutes or until edges are slightly brown.

8. <u>Brownies, Unfrosted</u>

1 cup shortening 1 1/2 cups flour 2 cups sugar 10 tablespoons cocoa 4 eggs 1 teaspoon salt

1 teaspoon vanilla

Brownies, Unfrosted (cont'd)

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Cream shortening & sugar together. Add unbeaten eggs & mix well. Add the vanilla, sifted flour, cocoa, & salt. Spread in a well-greased 9"x13" pan & bake for 30 minutes. Cool & cut into squares.

9. Baking Powder Biscuits, Rolled

2 cups flour

3 teaspoons baking powder

1 teaspoon salt

1/4 cup shortening

3/4 cup milk

Preheat oven to 400 degrees. Measure flour and mix dry ingredients well in bowl. Cut in shortening with pastry blender until mixture looks like "meal". Stir in almost all the milk. If dough does not seem pliable, add enough to make a soft, puffy dough easy to roll out. (Too much milk makes dough sticky, not enough makes biscuits dry.) Round up on lightly floured cloth-covered board. Knead lightly 20 to 25 times. Handle lightly.

Roll dough or pat out (with floured hands) to about 1/2" thick. Cut close together with floured biscuit cutter. Fit leftover bits together. Do not re-knead. Pat out dough, roll smooth and cut as desired. Place close together for biscuits with soft sides, an inch apart for biscuits with crusty sides, on ungreased baking sheet. Place in middle of oven. Bake 10 to 12 minutes. Serve hot. This recipe makes 20 1 3/4" biscuits (1" high).

10. Cake, Angel Food

1 cup cake flour 3/4 cup plus 2 tablespoons sugar (granulated)

1 1/2 cups egg whites (12) 1 1/2 teaspoons cream of tartar

1/4 teaspoon salt

3/4 cup sugar (granulated) 1 1/2 teaspoons vanilla 1/2 teaspoon almond flavoring

Heat oven to 375 degrees. Have ready a tube pan, 10"x4", but do not grease. Measure flour by dip-level-pour method or by sifting. Stir flour and first amount of sugar together to blend. Measure egg whites, cream of tartar and salt into large bowl. Beat until foamy. Gradually add second amount of sugar, 2 tablespoons at a time. Continue beating until meringue holds stiff peaks. Fold in flavorings. Sprinkle flour-sugar mixture over meringue. Fold in gently, just until the flour-sugar mixture disappears. Push batter into ungreased 10-inch tube pan. Gently cut through batter. Bake 30 to 35 minutes. Invert on a funnel. Let stand until cool.

11. Cake, Sponge

1 1/2 cups sifted cake flour

1 teaspoon baking powder

1/2 teaspoon salt 6 egg volks (about 1/2 cup)

1 1/2 cups sugar (granulated)

1/3 cup cold water

2 teaspoons vanilla

1 teaspoon lemon flavoring

1 teaspoon grated lemon rind, if desired

6 egg whites (3/4 cup)

1/2 teaspoon cream of tartar

Heat oven to 325 degrees. Sift, flour, baking powder, and salt together; set aside. Beat egg yolks in a small mixer bowl until very thick and lemon-colored. Pour beaten yolks into large bowl and beat in sugar gradually. Beat dry ingredients in alternately (slowly, on low speed) with water, flavorings, and rind. In large bowl, beat egg whites and cream of tartar until stiff. Gradually and gently fold egg volk mixture into beaten whites. Pour into ungreased tube pan, 10" x 4". Bake 60-65 minutes or until top springs back when lightly touched. Turn pan upside down with tube over neck of funnel or bottle. Cool. Remove from pan.

12. Cake, Quick Coffee Cake with Streusel Topping

Sift together:

2 cups sifted flour

1 cup sugar

3 teaspoons baking powder

1 teaspoon salt

Cake, Quick Coffee Cake with Streusel Topping (cont'd)

Add:

1/3 cup soft butter or margarine

1 egg

1 cup milk

Beat two minutes and pour into greased 9" pan. Cover with streusel topping. Bake at 350 degrees for 35- 40 minutes. Serve warm.

Streusel Topping

2 tablespoons hard butter or margarine

1/4 cup brown sugar 1 teaspoon cinnamon 2 tablespoons flour

Cut in ingredients with a fork.

13. Bread, Banana

1/2 cup shortening2 cups sifted flour1 cup brown sugar1 teaspoon baking soda2 eggs1/2 teaspoon salt

2 bananas (mashed), 1 1/4 cups

Cream shortening: add sugar gradually and cream well. Add eggs, one at a time. Add mashed bananas, and sifted dry ingredients. Pour into greased, 5 3/4" x 3 x 2 1/2" bread pans. Bake 45-50 minutes at 350 degrees. NOTE: Use ripe bananas for best results.

14. Bread, Pumpkin

1 3/4 cups flour 1/2 teaspoon allspice

1 teaspoon soda 1/3 cup water

1/4 teaspoon salt 1 cup pumpkin (cooked and sieved or canned)

1/2 teaspoon cinnamon1 1/2 cups sugar1/4 teaspoon baking powder1/2 cup oil1/2 teaspoon nutmeg2 eggs

1/2 teaspoon cloves

Beat eggs, oil, and sugar; stir in water and pumpkin. Sift together dry ingredients separately. Stir into pumpkin mixture until thoroughly mixed. Pour into greased bread (large) pans. Bake at 350 degrees for 60-70 minutes. Makes one large loaf (9x5x3) or 3 small loaves (5 3/4x3x2 1/2). Bake small loaves 45-50 minutes.

15. <u>Bread, Zucchini</u>

3 teaspoons vanilla 3 teaspoons cinnamon

3 eggs 3 cups flour 1 cup oil 1 cup sugar

1 teaspoon salt 2 cups grated zucchini

1 teaspoon soda

1 teaspoon baking powder

Beat eggs, oil, and sugar until thick and foamy. Stir in vanilla and zucchini. Combine dry ingredients in another bowl. Stir into zucchini mixture until well blended. Pour into 1 9x5x3 loaf pan or three 5 3/4 x 3 x 2 1/2 inch pans that have been greased. Bake at 350 degrees for about 1 hour. Cool 10 minutes before turning out.

16. <u>Dinner Rolls, Yeast, Any shape - Sweet Roll Dough</u>

1/4 cup warm water (not hot - 100 to 115 degrees)

1 package active dry yeast 3/4 cup lukewarm milk*

1/4 cup sugar 1 teaspoon salt 1 egg

1/4 cup soft shortening 3 1/2 to 3 3/4 cups flour

Dinner Rolls, Yeast, Any shape - Sweet Roll Dough (cont'd)

*Scald milk, then cool to lukewarm to destroy enzymes which make dough sticky and hard to handle. In bowl, dissolve yeast in water. Add milk, sugar, egg, salt, shortening, and half of flour to yeast. Mix with spoon until smooth. Add enough remaining flour to handle easily. Turn onto lightly floured board; knead until smooth (5 minutes). Round up in greased bowl, bring greased side up. Cover with cloth. Let rise in warm place (85 degrees) until double, about 1 1/2 hours. (If kitchen is cool, place dough on a rack over a bowl of hot water and cover completely with a towel). Punch down; let rise again until almost double, about 30 minutes. Shape, let rise and bake as directed in specific recipes.

Old Fashioned Dinner Rolls

Form dough into balls 1/3 size desired. Place close together in a greased round pan.






Cloverleaf Rolls Form bits of dough into balls about 1" in diameter. Place 3 balls in each greased muffin cup.

Crescents (Butter horns)

Roll dough about 1/4" thick into a 12" circle. Spread with soft butter. Cut into 16 pieshaped pieces. Beginning at rounded edge roll up. Place on pan, point underneath.







Picnic Buns

square, 1/2" thick. Cut into 9 buns, each 2 1/2" square. Place on greased sheet. Let rise until double. Bake 12 to 15 minutes.

Knots

Twist and tie each strip into a knot. Press ends down on greased sheet.

Twists

Twist strip of dough into a figure 8, but give strip additional twist just before placing it on sheet.





17. Cinnamon Rolls

Use Sweet Roll dough recipe. After dough rises, roll the dough into an oblong, 15"x 9" rectangle. Spread with 2 tablespoons softened butter and sprinkle with 1/2 cup sugar and 2 teaspoons cinnamon. Roll the dough up tightly, beginning at wide side. Seal well by pinching edges of roll together. Even up roll by stretching slightly.

Cut roll into 1" slices. Place in greased 13"x 9" pan or 18 greased muffin cups. Cover and let rise until double, 35 to 40 minutes. Heat oven to 375 degrees. Bake 25 to 30 minutes. Makes 1 1/2 dozen.

18. <u>Single Pastry Shell,</u> 2 variations - 8 or 9 inch one crust pie

1 cup flour

1/2 teaspoon salt

1/3 cup plus 1 tablespoon hydrogenated shortening

2 tablespoons water

Measure and mix flour and salt in bowl. Cut in shortening with pastry blender until particles are size of peas. Sprinkle with water, 1 tablespoon at a time, mixing with fork, until flour is moistened. Gather dough together with fingers so it cleans bowl. Press into ball. Turn out on lightly floured cloth-covered board.

Prepare rolling pin by covering with stockinet. Flour rubbed into covered board and stockinet keep dough from sticking, yet is not taken up by dough. Flatten with hand, roll out not quite 1/8" thick.

Single Pastry Shell (cont'd)

Roll lightly, being careful not to add extra flour as that makes pastry tough. Keep rounding edge of pastry. It if begins to break, pinch broken edges together immediately.

Keep pastry circular and roll about 1" larger around than the inverted pie pan. Fold pastry in half. Carefully, transfer to pie pan. Unfold and ease pastry loosely into pan, being careful not to stretch. Stretching causes pastry to shrink during baking. Trim pastry with scissors 1/2" from edge of pan. Fold pastry under, even with pan. Form a fluted edge by firmly placing the right index finger on the inside of rim, left thumb and index finger on outside of pastry at that point. Pinch. Repeat all around pie. Sharpen points by pinching each one firmly. Hook points under pan rim to help prevent shrinking during baking. Prick pie shell. Bake at 475 degrees 8 to 10 minutes. Cool. Fill with cream or chiffon-type filling or other refrigerated fillings. Finish according to recipe.

- 18. Single Pastry Shell, 2 variations (Easy Flaky Pie Crust)
 - 3 cups flour
 - 1 ½ cups shortening
 - ½ teaspoon salt
 - 5 tablespoons cool water
 - 1 tablespoon vinegar
 - 1 egg

Preheat oven to 425 degrees. Combine flour, shortening and salt, mix well. In another bowl, mix together water, vinegar and egg. Combine mixtures and mix lightly with fork. Roll out and put in pie pan. Bake at 425 degrees for 10-12 minutes.

NOTE: This can be rolled out several times and still comes out tender and flaky. Yield: 4 single pie crusts or 2 double.

Rules Governing Exhibits

Entries must be made in name of actual owner.

Please watch for updates on Facebook - Polk County Fair Official 4-H Poultry and Clover Connection. The Poultry Committee will not provide testing for turkeys. You will need to make other arrangements. Please be aware that poultry need to be at least 4 months of age to test, except for turkeys which need to be 6 months or older.

Absolutely no changes to entry can be made after the change date that the Superintendent of Entries sets. You may drop a class. You may also show in a lot that you aren't signed up for, but it will be for ribbon only.

We will be having an Individual Cage Decorating Contest! Cages will be judged Thursday evening. Winner to be announced at the Poultry Show.

Poultry and waterfowl from within Wisconsin need:

- An NPIP certificate stating that the birds originate from a US Pullorum-typhoid clean or NPIP affiliate flock and turkeys must test negative for Mycoplasma gallisepticum, or
- A DATCP-issued certificate stating they are from a Wisconsin Tested or Associate Flock and turkeys must test negative for Mycoplasma gallisepticum, Or
- Individually test sexually mature birds within 90 days before arrival at the show. These birds also need wing or leg band ID. All birds must test negative for pullorum-typhoid, and turkeys must test negative for *Mycoplasma gallisepticum*.

Poultry and waterfowl from outside Wisconsin need a certificate of veterinary inspection of equivalent (such as form VS 9-3) that states:

- They originate from a flock classified Pullorum-typhoid clean under NPIP or an equivalent state program and turkeys must test negative for Mycoplasma gallisepticum, or
- If they are sexually mature, that they have tested negative for Pullorum-typhoid (and Mycoplasma gallisepticum for turkeys) within 90 days before arrival at the show. These birds also need wing or leg band ID

Not required:

Import permit number

Requirements are subject to change as conditions warrant. For current information, check https://datcp.wi.gov/Pages/Programs Services/PoultryMovement.aspx.

Proper precaution will be taken to guard against accident or loss, but in no case will the Fair Society be responsible for loss or accident from any cause whatsoever. It is suggested exhibitors padlock cages except on judging day.

The State Department of Agriculture, or the fair or show management, reserves the right to have an approved veterinarian examine all fowl, and to exclude any fowl at any time for cause. Any exhibit excluded will be returned to the owner, or slaughtered, at the option of the attending veterinarian, or the State Department of Agriculture. If slaughtered, any return from the sale of the birds will be remitted directly to the owner.

All fowl exhibited may be subject to quarantine and slaughtered if any infectious or contagious disease is discovered among any of the fowl in the exhibit.

Exhibitors must provide their own <u>metal</u>, <u>plastic or glass water and feed containers</u>. Please attach your containers to the cage or be sure they are non-tippable.

AWARDS

All awards will be made by comparison to the American Standard of Perfection. No exhibit will be given a prize unless worthy of same.

PLEASE MAKE SURE YOUR BIRDS DON'T HAVE LICE. We reserve the right to disqualify your birds if found with lice and/or nits. If found, you will be required to immediately treat them.

Cockerels, pullets, young males and young females are defined as birds hatched in current year. Exhibitors and visitors will positively be prohibited from handling birds other than their own without the consent of the owners. Cage rental is \$1.00 per cage.

All rabbit exhibitors must present their rabbit to the rabbit barn superintendent or designated representative prior to placing their rabbit in a cage. If the number of entries exceeds the number of cages that are available preference will be given to junior exhibitors.

Rabbits should be tattooed for identification purposes by judging day.

Only rabbits meeting requirements of the breed as in the Rabbit Standards of Perfection book may be shown in lot numbers 1-206. A rabbit can only be shown once. During the rabbit show, anyone who has a scheduling conflict with showing their rabbit (except for the Showmanship class), please contact the Rabbit Barn Superintendent, and then arrange to have someone else show for you. Make sure this person has a card with your entry number on it. Make sure your substitute knows which cage the rabbit to be shown is in. Exhibitors are to furnish own glass or metal feed and water containers. NO PAPER CONTAINERS. Proper dishes will be available to purchase. If you have improper dishes, the superintendent will ask you to replace them. **No supplies or tack boxes left in the walkway.** Places to be used for storage will be limited and labeled. Only rabbits for exhibition will be allowed. NO SELLING of rabbits until after 4:30 p.m. on Sunday of the exhibit year.

Senior Bucks and Does are 8 months of age or older. Intermediate Bucks and Does are 6-8 months of age. Junior Bucks and Does are over 8 weeks and under 6 months of age.

Please do not bring doe rabbits with litters. This is not safe or healthy.

Rules:

- 1. See General Open Class rules in front pages of this Premium Book.
- 2. The lot descriptions indicate the number of stems, sprays and spikes needed for the exhibit and other display information. Entries are judged on the quality of bloom and foliage. Side buds or spikes should be removed on any SINGLE specimens.
- All horticulture entries must be grown by the exhibitor. Commercially grown cut flowers are not allowed.
- 4. Artificial or artificially dyed plants are not allowed.
- 5. Natural foliage should remain on stems above the water line, unless otherwise indicated. No additional foliage is allowed.

Rules (cont'd):

- Cut flowers should be shown in CLEAR glass containers of appropriate size. NO additions to the container such as pebbles, rocks, marbles, etc. No colored or opaque glass. Judge must be able to see through container.
- 7. Potted plants must have been in the exhibitor's possession for at least 90 days.
- 8. Combination plantings (planters) must have been in the exhibitor's possession for at least 6 weeks. Primary consideration is given to cultural perfection in judging combination plantings, and secondary consideration is given to effectiveness, color harmony and suitability of container.
- 9. All plants should be free from insects, disease and injury. Any exhibit with such will be disqualified and removed from the exhibition area.
- 10. Use of artificial leaf enhancements (leaf shine) is not allowed. WASH LEAVES.
- 11. Hosta Division: 1 leaf per Lot (Size) measured like this: Leaf length x leaf width = total number of inches for that size. Fit leaves into lot according to their measurements. For more information go to www.americanhostasociety.org.
- 12. Plants from the Wisconsin Endangered Species list are prohibited.
- 13. Decorative ribbons should not be used in floral designs.

- The lot descriptions indicate the number of stems, sprays and spikes needed for the exhibit and other display information. Entries are judged on the quality of bloom and foliage. Side buds or spikes should be removed on any SINGLE specimens.
- All horticulture entries must be grown by the exhibitor. Commercially grown cut flowers are not allowed.

Rules: (cont'd)

- 4. Artificial or artificially dyed plants are not allowed.
- Natural foliage should remain on stems above the water line, unless otherwise indicated. No additional foliage is allowed.
- Cut flowers should be shown in CLEAR glass containers or appropriate size. No colored or opaque glass allowed.
- 7. Potted plants must have been in the exhibitor's possession for at least 90 days.
- 8. Combination plantings (planters) must have been in the exhibitor's possession for at least 6 weeks. Primary consideration is given to cultural perfection in judging combination plantings, and secondary consideration is given to effectiveness, color harmony and suitability of container.
- 9. All plants should be free from insects, disease and injury. Any exhibit with such will be disqualified and removed from the exhibition area.
- 10. Use of artificial leaf enhancements (leaf shine) is not allowed. WASH LEAVES.
- 11. Plants from the Wisconsin Endangered Species list are prohibited.
- 12. Decorative ribbons should not be used in floral designs.
- 13. If a US Flag is used in any floral design, proper flag etiquette must be used.
- 14. Floral designs can use fresh and/or dried plant materials including wood or a combination of both
- 15. Arrangements should be completed before bringing into the flower building.
